Robert Lewis Medal and Dinner

The Libraries will present the sixth annual Robert Lewis Medal for Lifetime Achievement in Theater Research to Errol Hill at a special dinner on the evening of Friday, October 25. Professor Hill, a native Trinidadian trained at the British Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and Yale University, is an internationally recognized educator and author of the influential Shakespeare in Sable: A History of Black Shakespearean Actors and The Jamaican Stage, 1655-1900. He currently serves as the John D. Willard Professor of Drama and Oratory at Dartmouth College.

The Robert Lewis Dinner will also mark the opening of the exhibition "Artists, Players, and Literati" during an informal cocktail hour, beginning at 6:00 p.m. in the Department of Special Collections & Archives Reading Room on the 12th floor of the Main Library. Earnestly Seeking Citation Index Users

As reported last month, the citation databases from the Institute of Scientific Information (ISI) will soon become available to users in all OhioLINK libraries. This networked version is a brand new product from ISI and is being developed as a Web-based resource. To date, the data for 1995-96 has been loaded. Kent State University and Case Western Reserve University are the designated beta test sites for the product. We seek users with Web access who are willing to test this product and comment on its usability. This is a very unique opportunity for users to influence the development of an important commercially-supplied information resource.

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New, Improved Dial Access

One hundred new dialup lines will be installed during November in an effort to improve the accessibility, speed, and functionality associated with dialing into the campus network. The new lines will support PPP and SLIP access as well as other network protocols at speeds up to 28.8 KBits (analog) and 128 KBits (ISDN). Access to this service will be authenticated, and University Information Systems (UIS) is currently developing the registration procedure. Computer Lab in Main Library Reopens

Academic Computing and Technology would like to announce the reopening of the computer lab on the first floor of the Library. The Library lab now houses 88 fully networked 133 MHz Pentium computers with 17" monitors. Now, OVID Databases via the Web

The OVID databases (*AIDSline, BioethicsLine, Biological Abstracts, CancerLit, CINAHL, Compendex, ERIC, HealthSTAR, PsycInfo*) are now available through a Web interface. ARTFL, the latest OhioLINK database, is a full-text database of 2,000 French texts from the 13th century to the present in the areas of literature, philosophy, arts, and sciences. It is a cooperative project of the Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique and the University of Chicago and serves as a research tool for scholars and students in all areas of French studies. New in Government Documents

<u>Trends in the Well-Being of America's Children and</u> <u>Youth: 1996</u> (Government Documents, HE 1.63: 996). is a recently-published report from the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services provides an in-depth examination of social and economic factors affecting the nation's young people. The report combines tables, graphs, and text to describe national trends in the following five areas: population, family, and neighborhood; economic security; health conditions and health care; social development, behavioral health, and teen fertility; and education and achievement.

Two reports from the Surgeon General advocate reversing unhealthy trends. According to <u>Physical</u> <u>Activity and Health: A Report of the Surgeon General</u> (Government Documents, HE 20.7602: P 56), approximately 60% of the American people do not exercise regularly. The report states: "People of all ages can improve their quality of life through a lifelong practice of moderate physical activity." For example, exercise significantly reduces the risk of heart disease, the leading cause of death in the United States.

<u>Preventing Tobacco Use Among Young People: A</u> <u>Report of the Surgeon General (Government Documents,</u> HE 20.7602: T 55) is the first report from the Surgeon General devoted to the health consequences of cigarette smoking and smokeless tobacco use by young people. Cigarette smoking is identified as the addictive behavior most likely to be established during adolescence. The report documents young people's use of tobacco and describes community programs to discourage tobacco use.
