There are Web resources and then there are Web resources......

Librarians are working with an increasing number of students who have been advised by their instructors not to use Web resources in completing their assignments. This is interpreted, of course, as a prohibition on anything that is accessed through a Web browser. However, this causes a dilemma given that more and more traditional library resources are now only Web-accessible, including most of the major indexes to journal articles and a growing number of scholarly journals.

We understand that for most users it is not possible to know which resources available through the Libraries & Media Services' Web site represent:

- selection based upon criteria similar to that used for print materials.
- access provided through purchase or subscription and therefore limited to valid users at Kent State University.

Therefore, we are considering labeling those Web-accessible resources menued on the Libraries' Web site that have both of the characteristics described above. An example of how this would look is:

Periodical Abstracts

The key would indicate that these resources have been selected and are subscribed to by the Libraries or by OhioLINK and that access is limited to Kent State University users.

Significant Changes for Select Databases

Dataware, OhioLINK's new search interface, is being implemented for 10 additional databases. By the end of January, it will be the only access available for *Biological Abstracts* and *Compendex*. The remaining 8 databases will continue to have OVID access as well through March. Therefore, for these, you will see two access links—for Dataware and OVID—provided through the Libraries' homepage. Databases Recently Added

A number of databases have been added in the past two months. Most of these are being made available because of our participation in OhioLINK. All but one are Web-accessible (the exception is noted below) and are menued through the Libraries' Web site (http://www.library.kent.edu) under "Article Indexes/Research Databases." Web access means that they are available through any computer connected to the campus network. Off-campus users who qualify can connect through University PPP accounts, or access is possible for any valid user with a personal Internet Service Provider (ISP). The ISP connection requires setting browser preferences to connect through the University Web proxy server. Instructions on using the proxy server are available at: http://www.library.kent.edu/internet/proxy.html. AccessUN

AccessUN, an index to United Nations publications, is now available on the Web. AccessUN is easy to use and indexes publications beginning in 1996. It supplements the United Nations Index on CD-ROM which is available on the first floor of the Main Library and in the Government Documents Department on the 10th floor. The CD-ROM offers retrospective indexing back to 1961. Government Documents has the complete collection of UN publications, going back to 1945. The Government Documents staff is available to assist users with the Web or CD-ROM indexes and with accessing publications from the collection.

America: History and Life

America: History and Life is a complete bibliographic reference to the history of the United States and Canada from prehistory to the present. Published since 1964, the database comprises almost 400,000 bibliographic entries, providing an incomparable research tool for students and researchers of U.S. and Canadian history.

Black Studies on Disc (Main Library access only)

Workstations in the Reference Center, Main Library, now provide access to *Black Studies on Disc*. This resource provides access to the cumulative catalog of the New York Public Library's Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture, considered one of the foremost centers for the study of people of African descent worldwide. The *Catalog* contains more than 108,000 citations to works by and about people of African origin. Also on the CD-ROM is the last five years of the *Index to Black Periodicals* covering relevant information appearing in popular and scholarly periodical

Business & Industry (B&I)

Business & Industry is a database of broad-based business information at an international level. It includes 60% full-text coverage and draws business news, facts and events from over 1000 trade publications, national, international, regional newspapers, business dailies, and newsletters. The focus is on facts, figures, key events, market information and intellectual property information.

Contemporary Women's Issues

The *Contemporary Women's Issues* database provides full-text access to global information on women, including information from journals, newsletters, and research reports from non-profit groups, government and international agencies. Information on women in over 190 countries is compiled to bring together information from such disciplines as sociology, psychology, health, education, business.

GeoRef

GeoRef is the American Geological Institute's geoscience database containing over 1.9 million records of North America since 1785 and other areas of the world since 1933. The database is the equivalent of four major reference publications: Bibliography of North American Geology, Bibliography and Index of Geology Exclusive of North America, Geophysical Abstracts, and the Bibliography and Index of Geology. Until now there was limited access to the CD-ROM product.

Historical Abstracts

Historical Abstracts is an index to scholarly material dealing with the history of the world from 1450 to the present (excluding the United States and Canada, which are covered in America: History and Life).

Statistical Universe

Statistical Universe is now available via the Libraries' Web site. It was previously available in the Main Library on CD-ROM. This preeminent index bills itself as providing the "most comprehensive access to U.S. statistical information." The sources indexed include those from Federal agencies, associations, business organizations, commercial publishers, independent research organizations, state governments, university research centers, and international organizations. Some references link directly to full-text Web resources.

Growth Spurt for the *OhioLINK* Central Catalog!

Additional independent colleges have joined OhioLINK and are contributing their library holdings to the *OhioLINK*Central Catalog. As with other OhioLINK library holdings, these will be available for online or onsite borrowing.

Project Muse

The OhioLINK Electronic Journal Center (EJC) now includes over 40 scholarly journals from Project MUSE. Published by Johns Hopkins University Press, this collection includes a wide variety of humanities titles. Some titles are from 1995 forward and others begin with 1996. Proxy Server Technical Details

The Web proxy server enables valid users to connect to restricted resources from off campus using their personal Internet Service Provider. Proxy server instructions at: http://www.library.kent.edw/internet/proxy.html have been updated with more technical details. Included are HTML versions of all documentation. Assistance in using the proxy server is available from the University Information Systems HelpDesk (x.2031).

Student Multimedia Studio Expanding Services and Facilities:

The Student Multimedia Studio (formerly known as the Student Multimedia Development Lab) will be reopening in its permanent location in AVS with new computer systems and capabilities in time for the beginning of Spring semester on January 19. The Studio is available to any Kent student for the development of Web, multimedia, graphics, animation, or digital video projects for class or personal use.

New studio facilities feature two 2D/3D Graphics/Animation Workstations with Wacom Digitizing Tablets, two Digital Video Production Workstations, seven Web Development / 2D Graphics Production Workstations and an Interactive Multimedia Development Workstation with a CD Recorder. All workstations include color scanners and 100 MB Iomega Zip drives, 128 MB RAM, large (8 to 13) GB Hard Drives, 19" Monitors and T1 connections to the WWW.

Also available are 4 digital still cameras and a DV Camcorder for overnight use and photo-quality color printing services. The Student Multimedia Studio provides facilities on a do-it-yourself basis, or staff can provide one-on-one or small group training by appointment.

New on the Reference Shelves

American National Biography (REF CT213 .A68 1999, v.1-24):

This 24 volume set, published by the American Council of Learned Societies and Oxford University Press, is the successor to the *Dictionary of American Biography*. The 17,500 biographies have been updated and revised by more than 6,000 historians and scholars. Criteria for inclusion was substantially broadened to reflect our diverse history, attempting to cover "all sects and sections, races, classes and parties" of American life. Leaders such as Sojourner Truth, Charles Guiteau, and Martha Washington, who were formerly omitted, are now well-represented in this collection.

International Dictionary of Historic Places (REF CC135.I585 1994, v.1-5):

This Fitzroy-Dearborn dictionary contains essays on over 1,000 historic places. The five volumes are divided into geographic areas: Americas; Northern Europe; Southern Europe; Middle East and Africa; and Asia and Oceania. Each essay provides a physical description, photograph, geographic location, contact information, an in-depth history, and a bibliography for further reading.

Netprint Addresses Printing Needs

Netprint has been deployed on the 1st and 2nd floors of the Main Library and is being extended to other labs on campus and eventually to branch libraries as well. The system uses the new campus one-card ID. The user swipes her/his one-card at the printstation and then selects and prints his/her print job. The charge is deducted from the user's "gold account" on the one-card system.

Lab and library managers across campus have agreed to a uniform implementation of this project. They have also agreed to a uniform price of 7 cents for the standard 8.5 x 11" black and white laserprint. This project promises to deliver networked control of laserprinting campus-wide, while requiring the administration of only one system. More importantly, it offers a single look and feel for the user across campus— the cost, the process, and the look of the user screens will all be uniform.

New InfoSource Tutorials

(1) Download from the Web site mentioned above by selecting the tutorial of choice and clicking on "Diskless Download." This will be one file that you will save to a temporary directory on your hard drive. After the tutorial has downloaded successfully, go to the directory with the file using "File Manager" or "Windows Explorer." Double click on the filename, which will cause the tutorial to install automatically.

OR

(2) Bring computer disks to the Computer Lab, 1st floor, Main Library. Student assistants will show you how to download to the disks.
