On July 31, 1980, John Begala donated his papers to the American History Research Center at Kent State University. Additional materials were received on September 5, 1980, and added to the collection.

The son of Joseph and Harriet Begala, John Begala was born on November 29, 1950. His father was a noted athlete and wrestling coach at Kent State University, and his papers are located in the University Archives, collection number XIV. 11. (46). After attending the Kent State Laboratory School, John entered the University and earned a Bachelor's degree in political science in 1972. In 1975 he received a Master of Arts degree in history, with a minor in political science.

While enrolled as a graduate student, Mr. Begala embarked on his political career. He waged a successful campaign and was elected to the post of City Councilman-at-Large in Kent, Ohio. He served one term in City Council before being elected, from the sixty-second district, to the Ohio House of Representatives in November, 1976. He served in the 112th General Assembly, and, after being re-elected in 1978, in the 113th General Assembly. In addition to the chairmanship of the Human Resources Committee, his service in the Ohio House includes membership on the Ways and Means Committee as well as the Local Government Committee.

After the first twenty-four folders in the collection, consisting of materials not related to Mr. Begala's tenure in political office, this collection has been arranged in three general categories and subdivided by type of material as follows:

The collection has been processed according to the order it was in when it arrived. The first twenty-four folders in Box 1 have been arranged in alphabetical order by subject. The first general category, City Council materials, has been subdivided according to type, and arranged alphabetically by folder headings, with the materials within each folder placed

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in chronological order. At the end of this division may be found two lists for publications acquired during Mr. Begala's term on City Council. The first one lists those publications retained in the Archival shelf area, and the second list designates those publications transferred to the Acquisitions Department for addition to the main collection.

The largest mass of materials in the collection falls under the heading of the 112th General Assembly. Outgoing and incoming correspondence, and that dealing with constituent problems, has been arranged chronologically and placed at the beginning of this category. After the correspondence, for both the 112th and 113th General Assembly divisions, can be found Representative Begala's appointment calendars. These include not only the bound "Executive Planners", but also the daily notes he kept on loose sheets of paper. The latter personal calendar sheets are not complete but have been placed in chronological order insofar as possible.

The subdivisions, for the 112th General Assembly only, consist of House and Senate Bills, respectively. Resolutions from both these bodies are filed at the beginning of their appropriate section. All correspondence or other materials relating to a specific bill, and originally filed with that bill, have been left in their respective folders. Since dates are only occasionally included or placed on the copies of House and Senate Bills, the bills have been maintained in the numerical order under which they were originally filed when first offered on the House or Senate floor.

The materials pertaining to the 113th General Assembly consist only of correspondence and appointment calendars; no House or Senate Bills have been donated at this time. Throughout the collection, but primarily in the General Assembly materials, whenever an item has been found with an important signature upon it, it has been removed to the autograph file and a xerox copy inserted in its respective place in the folder. Photographs were also included with the collection. These are listed at the end of the last box and are located in the audio-visual (av) file.

This collection will appeal to researchers with a variety of interests. The City Council materials will prove beneficial to those interested in issues from the mid-1970's. They also demonstrate the mechanical workings of the Kent City Government. It was during Mr. Begala's term as City Councilman that the city decided to change from a mayoral form of government to one with

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a city manager. Some of the debate on this issue, as well as the search for a suitable city manager, is documented in this material.

For those interested in lobbying efforts and Mr. Begala's stand on various state issues, the correspondence, both incoming and outgoing, reveals his position on many of the issues raised in the 112th, and, to some extent, the 113th General Assemblies. In addition to specific issues, a researcher can acquire a better understanding of the workings of state government and also of the responsibilities incumbent upon a state legislator. The materials also document Mr. Begala's special concerns. For example, one of the primary interests of his career, even before his term on City Council, has been better care and treatment for older citizens.

Property rights to this collection have been kindly donated to Kent State University. The literary rights will be transferred to the public domain upon Mr. Begala's death.
